# RESEARCH-LED

# OVERVIEW.

Taking inspiration from the unique geological landscapes formed by the movement of water through and around rocks above and beneath the territorial border on the island of Ireland, 'Moving Through and Around' celebrates interrelations and pathways between people and place forged through dance.

From Sean-Nós, hip-hop, Flamenco and set dancing, to contemporary, Scottish Country, jiving and line-dancing, the exhibition shares personal and place-specific experiences of dance that would not normally be recorded in mapping of dance on the island. This alternative cartography offers new perspectives on how dance is practiced, shared, and valued.

The exhibition also allows your moves to join the dance through a visual, sonic and choreographic encounter with the steps, sounds, and significant sites for dance in a rural border region.

The exhibition is part of the Dance Connects in Rural Border Regions project funded by Creative Ireland's Creative Communities on a Shared Island scheme (Creative Ireland Programme, 2023–2027). Dance Connects partners local authorities of Cavan, Monaghan, and Fermanagh–Omagh with practitioners of diverse dance communities working in their border areas, and researchers Professor Aoife McGrath (School of Arts, English and Languages, Queen's University Belfast) and Dr Victoria Durrer (School of Art History and Cultural Policy, University College Dublin). Employing an innovative, creative engagement approach combining dance practice—as—research and social science, partners are building a sustainable cross—border exchange that informs policy and is meaningful to the unique dance ecology of rural, cross—border areas.



#### Sean-nós, Set Dance, IRE

Marian Crowe is an award-winning Set Dancing and Sean Nós teacher from Cavan. Specialising in the improvisational, percussive Sean Nós tradition, she teaches in schools, arts centres, and community halls. Marian regularly collaborates with musicians such as Martin Donohoe, bringing Irish traditional dance into contemporary contexts while nurturing its roots.



Urban Motion is a leading hip hop coaching company, offering classes, school programs, camps, and workshops across the UK and Ireland. Rooted in Hip Hop culture, they focus on freestyle, creativity, and confidence, ensuring access for both urban and rural communities. Their mission: inspiring dancers of all ages to grow, perform, and thrive.



Irish choreographer Jessie Keenan works across live performance, film, and curation, merging dance with science, music, and visual art. A curator for Light Moves Festival, she has created works for Dublin Fringe, Cavan Arts, and Museum of Literature Ireland, supported by an Arts Council Next Generation Award. Her

practice bridges screen-based and live

choreographic experiences.

Ruth Clark has over 20 years' experience teaching Scottish Country and Ceilidh Dancing. Based in Northern Ireland, she shares traditional dance in schools and leads lively ceilidhs with the Alastair Scott Ceilidh Band. Her teaching celebrates the social and life-enhancing power of dance, connecting heritage with contemporary joy and community.



Seville-born dancer Rebeca Sánchez trained in Flamenco at the Conservatory of Dance in Seville and has performed across Europe. She works as both teacher and performer, regularly collaborating with guitarist Juan José Manzano. From major orchestral works at Dublin's NCH to community workshops, Rebeca is dedicated to sharing Flamenco's artistry with diverse audiences.



Artistic Director of Dylan Quinn Dance Theatre since 2010, Dylan has 27+ years experience as dancer, choreographer, and movement director. His work explores social, cultural, and political contexts, from borderland commissions to Abbey Theatre collaborations. Supported by Arts Councils North and South, Dylan is deeply committed to participatory dance and community engagement.



Fusion Dance School which is an award-winning school based in Cavan and Monaghan. Offering classes in styles including hip hop and heels, it provides a vibrant and creative environment for young dancers. Fusion is known for its inclusive approach, encouraging self-expression, confidence, and performance opportunities across the region.



Professor of Dance at Queen's University Belfast, Aoife has worked as a choreographer, performer, and Arts Council advisor. Her research values embodied knowledge within interdisciplinary collaborations spanning sociology, psychology, film, and health. Widely published and internationally funded, she bridges creative practice with engaged, policy-informing research.



Cultural Policy scholar at UCD and Co-Director of Cultural Policy Observatory Ireland, Victoria researches how policy and administration shape and are shaped by artistic practice. She specialises in engaged, collaborative, and mixed-methods research, bringing creative practice into dialogue with social science approaches and policymaking.



Dance researcher and choreographer, Argyro's work investigates dance, religion, and spirituality. Holding a PhD in Dance from Queen's University Belfast, she has choreographed across contemporary, ballet, and theatre, and held roles as artistic assessor for EU and Arts Council NI. She is a member of Postsecular Performances network.



Artist and PhD researcher at Queen's University Belfast, Helena works at the intersections of sound, visual art, performance, and digital interaction. Her internationally exhibited practice creates sensory encounters that invite participation and reflection, exploring how technology mediates experience and blurs boundaries between physical and digital forms.



Belfast-based photographer and filmmaker, Simon documents creative practices, cultural heritage, and landscapes. His projects include collaborations with dancers and artists, as well as international exhibitions from South Korea to London. His work explores communities, making processes, and evolving relationships with land and place.



Musician, vocalist, and producer, Sorca has worked nationally and internationally for over two decades. A Choice Music Prize winner with the band Ships, she composes and designs sound across film, contemporary dance, and television. Her practice blends technical expertise with emotional depth, exploring sound, memory, and movement.





This exhibition is suitable for staffed gallery and arts centre contexts. It cannot be exhibited in unattended or unsupervised venues due to the interactive technology involved.
